

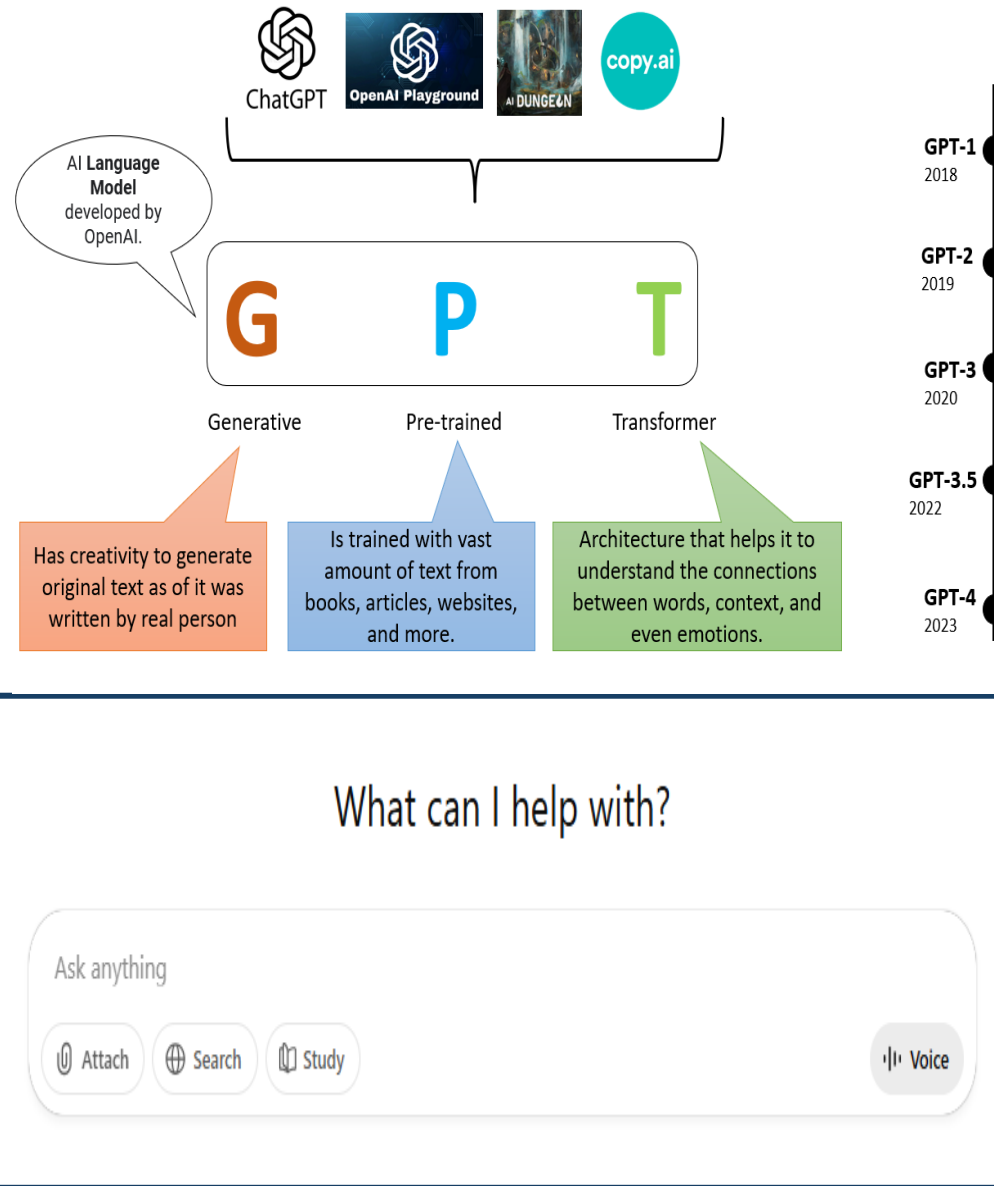
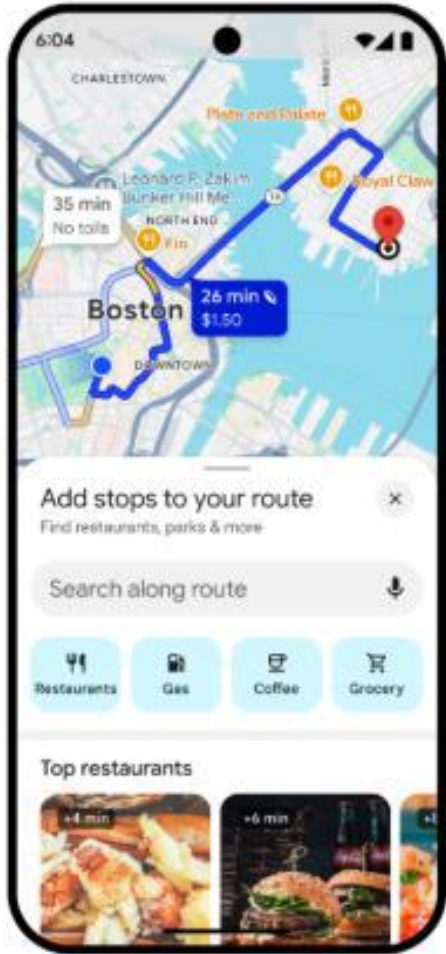
What is AI

- AI stands for Artificial Intelligence
- **Artificial Intelligence:** Technology that enables computers and machines to simulate or emulate human intelligence.
- Evolution
 - 1880: Regression Analysis (Francis Galton, 1885)
 - 1980: Expert Systems (optimizes information retrieval)
 - 1990: Machine Learning (learns from historical data)
 - Artificial Neural Networks
 - 2010: Deep Learning (learns from ongoing data)
 - Multi-layered Neural Networks
 - 2020: Generative AI (creates original content)
- Type of Learning
 - Supervised learning
 - Unsupervised learning
 - Reinforcement learning

What is AI

- **Artificial Intelligence:** Technology that enables computers and machines to simulate or emulate human intelligence by:
 - Fraud detection.
 - Diagnosing problems.
 - Forecasting future conditions.
 - Identifying and recognizing patterns.
 - Identifying corrective actions or responses.
 - Diagnosing problems and prescribing solutions.
 - Synthesizing new relationships between data sets.
 - Synthesizing and creating new language content from interactions with humans or historical content.
 - Operating machinery or moving vehicles.
 - Generating new artistic products (e.g., art, music, poetry, etc.)
 - Learning from past interactions and mistakes.

The Challenges of AI and Theology

- It may provide new tools for:
 - Theological research.
 - Spiritual practice.
 - Outreach and evangelism.
- It may challenge traditional doctrines on:
 - Human identity and consciousness.
 - The non-physical nature of the mind and the soul.
 - The doctrine of man.
 - The doctrine of creation.
 - The doctrine of the resurrection.
 - The legitimacy of the Old Testament.
- Risks:
 - Propagate doctrinal (religious or secular) biases into spiritual answers.
 - Decrease reliance on the Holy Spirit for guidance.
 - Decrease the human connection in spiritual counseling.
 - Could lead to the creation of an AI God.
 - Could lead to the creation of spiritual avatars: Moses, Paul, Jesus

What is a Christian?

- A Christian is someone who follows the teachings of Jesus Christ, whom Christians believe to be the Son of God and the Savior of humanity. The central tenets of Christianity include belief in one God, the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ for the forgiveness of sins, and the importance of loving others as oneself.
- Christianity is based on the Bible, which is divided into two main sections: the Old Testament (which is shared with Judaism) and the New Testament, which specifically focuses on the life, teachings, and works of Jesus.
